Note: The Department for Education's annual figures on adoptions and timeliness for children who have been adopted are published in the <u>Looked After Children statistical first release</u>. This is the most robust source of information on adoption.

HEADLINE MEASURES

2,550 children This is a 4% decrease from 30 June 2017 when there were waiting at 30 2,650 children waiting with a placement order not yet placed with

> 27% of children waiting at 30 September 2017 had been waiting 18 months or more.

Child timeliness The quarterly data suggests that the time taken between a child has stalled entering care and being placed with a family for children who were adopted during the first two quarters in 2017/18 was 14 months (Adoption Scorecard indicator A1).

> The average time between placement order and match for children who were adopted during the first two quarters in 2017/18 was 6 months (Adoption Scorecard indicator A2), the same when compared to 2016/17, where the average was also 6 months.

timeliness is declining

Adopter The latest quarterly data suggests adopter timeliness for local authorities is declining. In the first two quarters of 2017/18, 33% of approvals made by local authorities were made within 6 months of registration, this compares to 34% the previous year.

> The timeliness of matches for local authorities is also declining; 29% of matches were made within 3 months of approval in the first two quarters of 2017/18 compared to 31% during the same time period the previous year.

OTHER KEY HEADLINES

orders granted have fallen

New ADM Quarterly data suggests that the number of new decisions has **decisions and** continued to fall from 1260 in quarter 1 2017/18 to 1070 in quarter **placement** 2 2017/18; a decrease of 15%.

> The number of new placement orders has also fallen from 1050 in guarter 1 in 2017/18 to 870 in guarter 2 2017/18; a decrease of 17%.

care has decreased

Children In 2016/17 there were 4350 adoptions; a decrease of 8% **adopted from** compared to 2015/16 when there were 4710 adoptions.

> Quarterly data suggests that there were 900 children adopted in quarter 2 2017/18, a decrease of 4% compared to quarter 1 2017/18 when there were 940 children adopted

Adoptive family approvals have increased and registrations remained the same

Registrations to become an adopter have remained the same at 790 per quarter in 2017/18.

The number of families approved for adoption has increased from 570 in guarter 1 2017/18 to 680 in guarter 2 2017/18; an increase of 19%.

DATA SOURCES

New data This document has been updated with new data from the ALB quarterly survey providing information on children and adopters in the first two quarters of 2017/18 (April to June and July to September 2017).

SSDA903 Local authorities provide data on their looked after children using the data SSDA903 collection. Data are collected from all local authorities. The information is collected at child level and includes information about the child's characteristics and their dates for each stage of the care process, including adoption. The data goes through thorough quality assurance and local authorities are able to update their historic data annually. We therefore view this as the most robust source of information on adoption. It is used to produce the Looked After Children statistical first release. (SFR) and the Adoption Scorecards. The most recent data covers the year ending 31 March 2017.

survey

ALB In quarter 2 2017/18 the response rate from local authorities for the child quarterly level section was 94% and the adopter level section was 92%. Therefore national and regional figures on adoptions and adopters include estimates made for non-responses. Estimates are made by scaling to the regional level based on the number of adoptions in each LA during 2016-17 (from the SSDA903 data). The response rate for the adopter level section from Voluntary Adoption Agencies was 88%.

Ofsted data

Ofsted have previously published annual data on the recruitment of adopters and the children placed with them. From quarter 4 2014-15 the Ofsted data collection became part of the quarterly survey.
