Quarter 2 2018 to 2019 Update

February 2018

Note: The Department for Education's annual figures on adoptions and timeliness for children who have been adopted are published in the [Looked After Children statistical first release](#). This is the most robust source of information on adoption.

HEADLINE MEASURES

2,730 children waiting at 30 September 2018

This is a 6% decrease from 30 June 2018 when there were 2900 children waiting with a placement order not yet placed with an adoptive family.

41% of children waiting at 30 September 2018 had been waiting 18 months or more. This is an increase from 30 June 2018 when 33% of children waiting had been waiting 18 months or more.

Child timeliness for Adoption Scorecare A1 measure has improved

The quarterly data suggests that the time taken between a child entering care and being placed with a family for children who were adopted during the first two quarters of 2018/19 was 13 months (Adoption Scorecard indicator A1). This is a decrease of one month from 2017/18.

Child timeliness for Adoption Scorecard measure A2 has stalled

The average time between placement order and match for children who were adopted during the first two quarters in 2018/19 was 6 months (Adoption Scorecard indicator A2). This has remained the same as 2017/18.

Adopter approval timeliness is stalling

The latest quarterly data suggests adopter timeliness for local authorities has stalled. In the second quarter of 2018/19, 31% of approvals made by local authorities were made within 6 months of registration. This has remained the same as 2017/18.

Timeliness for matches is improving

However, timeliness of matches for local authorities is improving; 35% of matches were made within 3 months of approval in the second quarter of 2018/19 compared to 31% in 2017/18.

OTHER KEY HEADLINES

New ADM decisions have fallen Quarterly data suggests that the number of new decisions has continued to fall from 1260 in quarter 1 2018/19 to 1080 in quarter 2 2018/19; a decrease of 14%.

Placement orders granted have fallen The number of new placement orders has fallen from 1030 in quarter 1 in 2018/19 to 850 in quarter 2 2018/19; a decrease of 17%.

Children adopted from care has decreased In 2017/18 there were 3820 adoptions; a decrease of 13% compared to 2016/17 when there were 4370 adoptions. Quarterly data suggests that there were 1650 children adopted in the first two quarters of 2018/19; a decrease of 18% compared to the first two quarters 2017/18 when there were 2010 children adopted

Registrations have declined Registrations to become an adopter have declined from 950 in quarter 1 to 830 in quarter 2; a decrease of 13%.

Adoptive family approvals have increased The number of families approved for adoption has increased from 650 in quarter 1 2018/19 to 700 in quarter 2 2018/19; an increase of 8%.

DATA SOURCES

New data This document has been updated with new data from the ALB quarterly survey providing information on children and adopters in the first two quarter of 2018/19 (April to June and June to September 2018).

SSDA903 data Local authorities provide data on their looked after children using the SSDA903 collection. Data are collected from all local authorities. The information is collected at child level and includes information about the child's characteristics and their dates for each stage of the care process, including adoption. The data goes through thorough quality assurance and local authorities are able to update their historic data annually. We therefore view this as the most robust source of information on adoption. It is used to produce the the [Looked After Children Statistical First Release](#). (SFR) and the [Adoption Scorecards](#). The most recent data covers the year ending 31 March 2018.

ALB quarterly survey In quarter 2 2018/19 the response rate from local authorities for the child level section was 91% and the adopter level sections was 89%. Therefore, national and regional figures on adoptions and adopters include estimates made for non-responses. Estimates are made by scaling to the regional level based on the number of adoptions in each LA during 2016-17 (from the SSDA903 data). The response rate for the adopter level section from Voluntary Adoption Agencies was 72%.

Ofsted data Ofsted have previously published annual data on the recruitment of adopters and the children placed with them. From quarter 4 2014-15 the Ofsted data collection became part of the quarterly survey.
